Watching Point #38

38 — WATCH lest, in reducing error to zero, you neglect to rub out the zero. Once a lecturer told of a little Science girl who had a cold. She drew a zero on the front stoop with a piece of chalk to indicate that she had made nothing of the cold. After a few moments she ran back and rubbed out the zero.

In destroying error, you first translate it into a false belief. This does not destroy it, but uncovers it for self-destruction through your recognition of its nothingness. You must finally rub out the zero by knowing that, since God is All, no claim of an opposite to Him ever existed even as a false belief, to tempt His children; and even if it did, they could not be tempted by it, since they have no capacity to believe a lie, or even to be tempted to believe one.

I greatly appreciate the very clear two-step approach laid out in the current watching point #38.

- 1. Reduce the error to nothing know that it can have no power over you; God good is ALL.
- 2. Know that there was no error to begin with because if God did not create it then it was never created.

So incredibly useful!

Entirety – On Earth As It Is In Heaven

II Chronicles 33:8 – "According to the *whole* law" (Emphasis added).

This scripture reminded me of the tree of Life, as described in the visions of Ezekiel and John the Revelator: not one mention is made in their records of the existence in heaven of a "tree of knowledge of good and evil."

So the question remains, if God created the tree of knowledge of good and evil — i.e., the tree of knowledge of Truth and deceit, the tree of knowledge of Reality and hallucination, the tree of knowledge of law and lawlessness, etc. — then why isn't this tree found in heaven?

"Knowledge gained from material sense is figuratively represented in Scripture as a tree, bearing the fruits of sin, sickness, and death. Ought we not then to judge the knowledge thus obtained to be untrue and dangerous, since 'the tree is known by his fruit'?" (Science and Health, p. 299:18)

"Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven" means laying the ax at the root of anything on earth that is not found in heaven. This was Mrs. Eddy's mission! God grant me the grace to "carry the baggage of stern resolve, and keep pace with highest purpose" (*Science and Health*, p. 514), to wield the battle-ax of Science against everything contrary to knowledge of the Allness of Good. *********

Fruit of the Spirit

"The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, goodness, faith, meekness, temperance: against such there is no law." (Gal.5:22-23)

Love – Do I love enough – and divinely? Can I love more?

Joy – Am I expressing joy? Do I rejoice not only in my good, but in others' good?

Peace – Am I calm and undisturbed when faced with a problem? Or am I fearful, anxious, and agitated?

Longsuffering – Do I "bleed sweet" when faced with a difficulty? Or do I whine and complain? Gentleness – Do I have a soft manner when dealing with others? Or do I have a bad temper and rotten disposition when I don't get my way?

Goodness – Am I kind? Am I morally upright? Do I always do right?

Faith – Do I really trust that God is All? Meekness – Do I believe that there is only one Mind? Or do I think that I can know or do something apart from God?

Temperance – Do I indulge in any appetites – natural or otherwise? Do I indulge in passionate or emotional outbursts? Am I patient?

As I express these fruits of Spirit, no so-called law of matter can stand against me. ********

This Sunday's Roundtable (6/2/19) provided an excellent clarification on "fruit of the Spirit," — which was a very needful one — and that is, the fruit comes from the Spirit, and unless you have the Spirit of God within, you can't bear the "fruit" humanly. I missed that point completely, – the need of bringing it all back to Spirit, God, the only source of that "fruit." Very grateful for this, and for these Roundtables. ***********

No Longer "Joining in a Conspiracy Against [My]self"

cit. 5. John 17

15 I pray not that thou shouldest take them out of the world, but that thou shouldest keep them from the evil.

Reading Christ Jesus' words today, it occurred to me that this is yet another way that he was letting us know we are in our right place here and now, and need not wait for another time and place to think and act rightly. Wishing for some perfect afterlife (or to fade into blackness, as I once hoped) or some sort of reset button (like winning the lottery or meeting the "right" person) "is joining" in a conspiracy against [our]self" as it "would make that real which is unreal." (cit. 9. p. 339)

I have been so blessed by Christian Science and this church, but I feel the biggest blessing may well be that I have joy and gratitude and purpose being me. I spent decades truly hating being me, and now I am happy with it. I wasn't removed from the world or my life, so what else could have made the difference? It has to be that Christian Science and all I have been learning in Plainfield has shown me that "Since God is All, there is no room for His unlikeness. God, Spirit, alone created all, and called it good." (S&H 339:7) and I am a part of that all.

What a change from all I previously thought! I am so grateful for this church, and to no longer be "joining in a conspiracy against [my]self"! ****

- ...The righteous in Scripture denote the servants of God, the saints.

He observes them with approval and tender consideration; they are so dear to him that he cannot take his eyes off them; he watches each one of them as carefully and intently as if there were only that one creature in the universe. "His ears are open unto their cry." His eyes and ears are thus both turned by the Lord towards his saints; his whole mind is occupied about them: if slighted by all others they are not neglected by him. Their cry he hears at once, even as a mother is sure to hear her sick babe; the cry may be broken, plaintive, unhappy, feeble, unbelieving, yet the Father's quick ear catches each

note of lament or appeal, and he is not slow to answer his children's voice.

"Overcometh the World"

1 John 4 & 5:

"Ye are of God, little children, We are of God: he that knoweth God heareth us; For whatsoever is born of God overcometh the world: We know that whosoever is born of God sinneth not; but he that is begotten of God keepeth himself, and that wicked one toucheth him not."
