SUBJECT—ARE SIN, DISEASE, AND DEATH REAL?

GOLDEN TEXT: PSALM 27:1

"The LORD is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? the LORD is the strength of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?"

RESPONSIVE READING: Isaiah 12: 2-6
Isaiah 26: 3, 4

- **2.** Behold, God *is* my salvation; I will trust, and not be afraid: for the LORD JEHOVAH *is* my strength and *my* song; he also is become my salvation.
- 3. Therefore with joy shall ye draw water out of the wells of salvation.
- 4. And in that day shall ye say, Praise the LORD, call upon his name, declare his doings among the people, make mention that his name is exalted.
- 5. Sing unto the LORD; for he hath done excellent things: this *is* known in all the earth.
- **6.** Cry out and shout, thou inhabitant of Zion: for great *is* the Holy One of Israel in the midst of thee.
- **3.** Thou wilt keep *him* in perfect peace, *whose* mind *is* stayed *on thee:* because he trusteth in thee.
- **4.** Trust ye in the LORD for ever: for in the LORD JEHOVAH *is* everlasting strength.

LESSON SERMON

The Bible

1. Psalm 91 : 1-6, 9-11, 14-16

- He that dwelleth in the secret place of the most High shall abide under the shadow of the Almighty.
- I will say of the LORD, *He is* my refuge and my fortress: my God; in him will I trust.
- Surely he shall deliver thee from the snare of the fowler, *and* from the noisome pestilence.
- He shall cover thee with his feathers, and under his wings shalt thou trust: his truth *shall* be thy shield and buckler.
- Thou shalt not be afraid for the terror by night; *nor* for the arrow *that* flieth by day;
- Nor for the pestilence that walketh in darkness; nor for the destruction that wasteth at noonday.
- Because thou hast made the LORD, *which is* my refuge, *even* the most High, thy habitation:
- There shall no evil befall thee, neither shall any plague come night hy dwelling.
- For he shall give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways.
- Because he hath set his love upon me, therefore will I deliver him: I will set him on high, because he hath known my name.
- He shall call upon me, and I will answer him: I *will be* with him in trouble; I will deliver him, and honour him.
- With long life will I satisfy him, and shew him my salvation.

2. Isaiah 50:7, 10

For the Lord GOD will help me; therefore shall I not be confounded: therefore have I set my face like a flint, and I know that I shall not be ashamed.

- Who *is* among you that feareth the LORD, that obeyeth the voice of his servant, that walketh *in* darkness, and hath no light? let him trust in the name of the LORD, and stay upon his God.
- 3. Romans 1:1,9 (to 2nd,), 16 (I) (to;)
- Paul, a servant of Jesus Christ, called *to be* an apostle, separated unto the gospel of God,
- For God is my witness, whom I serve with my spirit in the gospel of his Son,
- I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth;

4. Acts 20 : 7-12

- And upon the first *day* of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight.
- And there were many lights in the upper chamber, where they were gathered together.
- And there sat in a window a certain young man named Eutychus, being fallen into a deep sleep: and as Paul was long preaching, he sunk down with sleep, and fell down from the third loft, and was taken up dead.
- And Paul went down, and fell on him, and embracing *him* said, Trouble not yourselves; for his life is in him.
- When he therefore was come up again, and had broken bread, and eaten, and talked a long while, even till break of day, so he departed.
- And they brought the young man alive, and were not a little comforted.
- 5. Acts 27: 1 (it) (to 1st,), 4, 14 (not), 15, 20, 21 (to 3rd,), 22 (I)-25, 36, 37, 44 (And so)
- 1 ...it was determined that we should sail into Italy,
- And when we had launched from thence, we sailed under Cyprus, because the winds were contrary.
- ...not long after there arose against it a tempestuous wind, called Euroclydon.

- And when the ship was caught, and could not bear up into the wind, we let *her* drive.
- And when neither sun nor stars in many days appeared, and no small tempest lay on *us*, all hope that we should be saved was then taken away.
- But after long abstinence Paul stood forth in the midst of them, and said, Sirs,
- I exhort you to be of good cheer: for there shall be no loss of *any man's* life among you, but of the ship.
- For there stood by me this night the angel of God, whose I am, and whom I serve,
- Saying, Fear not, Paul; thou must be brought before Cæsar: and, lo, God hath given thee all them that sail with thee.
- Wherefore, sirs, be of good cheer: for I believe God, that it shall be even as it was told me.
- Then were they all of good cheer, and they also took *some* meat.
- And we were in all in the ship two hundred threescore and sixteen souls.
- And so it came to pass, that they escaped all safe to land.

6. Acts 28: 1-6, 30, 31

- And when they were escaped, then they knew that the island was called Melita.
- And the barbarous people shewed us no little kindness: for they kindled a fire, and received us every one, because of the present rain, and because of the cold.
- And when Paul had gathered a bundle of sticks, and laid *them* on the fire, there came a viper out of the heat, and fastened on his hand.
- And when the barbarians saw the *venomous* beast hang on his hand, they said among themselves, No doubt this man is a murderer, whom, though he hath escaped the sea, yet vengeance suffereth not to live.
- And he shook off the beast into the fire, and felt no harm.
- Howbeit they looked when he should have swollen, or fallen down dead suddenly: but after they had looked a great while, and saw no harm come to him, they changed their minds, and said that he was a god.

- And Paul dwelt two whole years in his own hired house, and received all that came in unto him,
- Preaching the kingdom of God, and teaching those things which concern the Lord Jesus Christ, with all confidence, no man forbidding him.

7. Revelation 1:1 (to;)

The Revelation of Jesus Christ, which God gave unto him, to shew unto his servants things which must shortly come to pass;

8. Revelation 7: 9 (lo), 10, 12 (Blessing)

- 9 ...lo, a great multitude, which no man could number, of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues, stood before the throne, and before the Lamb, clothed with white robes, and palms in their hands;
- And cried with a loud voice, saying, Salvation to our God which sitteth upon the throne, and unto the Lamb.
- Blessing, and glory, and wisdom, and thanksgiving, and honour, and power, and might, *be* unto our God for ever and ever. Amen.

Science and Health

1. 593:20-22

SALVATION. Life, Truth, and Love understood and demonstrated as supreme over all; sin, sickness, and death destroyed.

2. 39:18-30

"Now," cried the apostle, "is the accepted time; behold, now is the day of salvation," — meaning, not that now men must prepare for a future-world salvation, or safety, but that now is the time in which to experience that salvation in spirit and in life. Now is the time for so-called material pains and material pleasures to pass away, for both are unreal, because impossible in Science. To break this earthly spell, mortals must get the true idea and divine Principle of all that really exists and governs the universe harmoniously. This thought is apprehended slowly, and the interval before its attainment is attended with doubts and defeats as well as triumphs.

3. 406:1-6

The Bible contains the recipe for all healing. "The leaves of the tree were for the healing of the nations." Sin and sickness are both healed by the same Principle. The tree is typical of man's divine Principle, which is equal to every emergency, offering full salvation from sin, sickness, and death.

4. 22:3-17

Vibrating like a pendulum between sin and the hope of forgiveness, — selfishness and sensuality causing constant retrogression, — our moral progress will be slow. Waking to Christ's demand, mortals experience suffering. This causes them, even as drowning men, to make vigorous efforts to save themselves; and through Christ's precious love these efforts are crowned with success.

"Work out your own salvation," is the demand of Life and Love, for to this end God worketh with you. "Occupy till I come!" Wait for your reward, and "be not weary in well doing." If your endeavors are beset by fearful odds, and you receive no present reward, go not back to error, nor become a sluggard in the race.

5. 426 : 5-22

The discoverer of Christian Science finds the path less difficult when she has the high goal always before her thoughts, than when she counts her footsteps in endeavoring to reach it. When the destination is desirable, expectation speeds our progress. The struggle for Truth makes one strong instead of weak, resting instead of wearying one. If the belief in death were obliterated, and the understanding obtained that there is no death, this would be a "tree of life," known by its fruits. Man should renew his energies and endeavors, and see the folly of hypocrisy, while also learning the necessity of working out his own salvation. When it is learned that disease cannot destroy life, and that mortals are not saved from sin or sickness by death, this understanding will quicken into newness of life. It will master either a desire to die or a dread of the grave, and thus destroy the great fear that besets mortal existence.

6. 216: 28-1

When you say, "Man's body is material," I say with Paul: Be "willing rather to be absent from the body, and to be present with the Lord." Give up your material belief of mind in matter, and have but one Mind, even God; for this Mind forms its own likeness.

7. 164 : 13-16, 23-25

Much yet remains to be said and done before all mankind is saved and all the mental microbes of sin and all diseased thought-germs are exterminated.

But the forever fact remains paramount that Life, Truth, and Love save from sin, disease, and death.

8. 390:12-26

When the first symptoms of disease appear, dispute the testimony of the material senses with divine Science. Let your higher sense of justice destroy the false process of mortal opinions which you name law, and then you will not be confined to a sick-room nor laid upon a bed of suffering in payment of the last farthing, the last penalty demanded by error. "Agree with thine adversary quickly, whiles thou art in the way with him." Suffer no claim of sin or of sickness to grow upon the thought. Dismiss it with an abiding conviction that it is illegitimate, because you know that God is no more the author of sickness than He is of sin. You have no law of His to support the necessity either of sin or sickness, but you have divine authority for denying that necessity and healing the sick.

9. 514:26-3

Understanding the control which Love held over all, Daniel felt safe in the lions' den, and Paul proved the viper to be harmless. All of God's creatures, moving in the harmony of Science, are harmless, useful, indestructible. A realization of this grand verity was a source of strength to the ancient worthies. It supports Christian healing, and enables its possessor to emulate the example of Jesus. "And God saw that it was good."

10. 391:7-13

Instead of blind and calm submission to the incipient or advanced stages of disease, rise in rebellion against them. Banish the belief that you can possibly entertain a single intruding pain which cannot be ruled out by the might of Mind, and in this way you can prevent the development of pain in the body. No law of God hinders this result.

11. 392: 8-10, 24 (Stand)-3

The only course is to take antagonistic grounds against all that is opposed to the health, holiness, and harmony of man, God's image.

Stand porter at the door of thought. Admitting only such conclusions as you wish realized in bodily results, you will control yourself harmoniously. When the condition is present which you say induces disease, whether it be air, exercise, heredity, contagion, or accident, then perform your office as porter and shut out these unhealthy thoughts and fears. Exclude from mortal mind the offending errors; then the body cannot suffer from them. The issues of pain or pleasure must come through mind, and like a watchman forsaking his post, we admit the intruding belief, forgetting that through divine help we can forbid this entrance.

12. 393:8-15

Mind is the master of the corporeal senses, and can conquer sickness, sin, and death. Exercise this God-given authority. Take possession of your body, and govern its feeling and action. Rise in the strength of Spirit to resist all that is unlike good. God has made man capable of this, and nothing can vitiate the ability and power divinely bestowed on man.

Daily Prayer

It shall be the duty of every member of this Church to pray each day: "Thy kingdom come;" let the reign of divine Truth, Life, and Love be established in me, and rule out of me all sin; and may Thy Word enrich the affections of all mankind, and govern them!

A Rule for Motives and Acts

Neither animosity nor mere personal attachment should impel the motives or acts of the members of The Mother Church. In Science, divine Love alone governs man; and a Christian Scientist reflects the sweet amenities of Love, in rebuking sin, in true brotherliness, charitableness, and forgiveness. The members of this Church should daily watch and pray to be delivered from all evil, from prophesying, judging, condemning, counseling, influencing or being influenced erroneously.

Alertness to Duty

It shall be the duty of every member of this Church to defend himself daily against aggressive mental suggestion, and not be made to forget nor to neglect his duty to God, to his Leader, and to mankind. By his works he shall be judged, — and justified or condemned.
