

Boston Light - Little Brewster Island (outer Boston Harbor), Massachusetts

Boston Light was the first light station in North America and is the country's oldest continuously used lighthouse site. The original structure, built in 1716, was destroyed during the Revolutionary War. Rebuilt in 1783, it has been called "the ideal American lighthouse." In the *Christian Science Sentinel* of September 6, 1913 on page ten, Archibald McLellan stated three most important points about the cover of the *Sentinel* and a minor change made at that time on its cover. Speaking of this change he said, "Beyond this there can be neither desire nor occasion for change in the *Sentinel*, because," he said, "Mrs. Eddy's instructions forbid any change." He explained this by saying, "Mrs. Eddy likewise gave instructions." The word "instructions" is most important. Speaking then of the two women, the lamps and the inscriptions beneath them, he said they had been "preserved as expressive of our Leader's thought. ..." Mrs. Eddy requested that the cover of the *Sentinel* be light blue in color."



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The Fifth Commandment

"Honour Thy Father and Thy Mother"

Christian Science shows us that our only Father-Mother is God, infinite Life, Truth, and Love. Therefore, if we take this commandment in its scientific meaning, it is God whom we must honor. As we realize the attributes of our Father-Mother God, we will see how the honoring of Him will extend eternally our consciousness of life.

We see that since God is our Father and Mother, He is the source or origin of man's existence; and God, who is Life itself, not only is the origin but the eternal sustainer of man's being. Our heavenly Father expresses His own being, through His spiritual ideas. His sons and daughters. God is changeless, therefore His expression or reflection must be changeless; that is, it forever expresses Life, and this reflection is the Son of God. No fear of death can enter the consciousness of the Son of God; no belief that life depends upon matter, or is mortal. Everlasting life is his perpetual consciousness. Christ Jesus demonstrated this truth and desired others to demonstrate it, for he said, "I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly."

As the Son of God, all that man possesses he inherits from God. He has no ancestors antecedent to God. Thus the true law of heredity becomes the most life-giving, joy-giving, and harmonious law conceivable. As a child develops, how often we hear the remark, "Isn't he like his mother!" or, "He has his father's ways." Sometimes this remark is no great compliment to the child, nor perhaps to the parent, but if applied to one as the child of God, what depth of meaning it would convey! God's man is the exact image of his divine Parent, and his activities and characteristics are a perfect reflection of the activity of his Father-Mother God.

A duty of a father and mother is to provide suitable and sufficient food and clothing for the

children; and the latter are taught to depend upon their parents for this supply. In our endeavor to honor our Father-Mother God, we must learn to depend absolutely upon Him for our supply, and in order to do this successfully, we must realize what supply is. We need to see that supply is never material, but always consists of right ideas. A sense of lack is not due to lack of matter, but to a seeming lack of right ideas, and the overcoming of this ignorance, through spiritual perception, is all that is required for the supply to be outwardly manifested. Our heavenly Father is never incapable of supplying our needs, nor is He ever unwilling to do so. He clothes man with holiness, beauty of character, joy, purity, freshness, love, truth, life, and thus all his needs are supplied.

A teacher, watching a little child trying to work out a problem in arithmetic, knows that the answer is already supplied, and that the child has only to reason out the correct answer in order to make it his own. Even the little child knows that there is a correct answer and that it is for him as much as for anyone else, if he only works according to rule. So it is with us.

Another duty of the parent is to provide a home for his children. In her interpretation of the last verse of the Twenty-third Psalm, Mrs. Eddy interprets "the house of the Lord," as "the consciousness of Love" (S&H, p. 578). As the children of God, then, this is our home — lighted by the brightness of spiritual understanding, filled with the warmth of infinite, impartial, universal, spiritual Love, peopled by God's ideas. No evil can possibly befall those in this dwelling. Every day is one round of usefulness and joy. Harmony reigns supreme. Every individual child expresses perfect, spontaneous obedience. No son ever leaves his Father's home, for there are sufficient opportunities in it for manifesting all his capabilities and gratifying all his desires, which are spiritual and pure.

A father is expected to look after the education of his children. Our divine Father-Mother, infinite Mind, not only does this, but is Himself the Mind, intelligence, of His own

children, or spiritual ideas. These ideas express perfectly the divine intelligence. There is no past in the divine Mind to be either remembered or forgotten, and no future to fear or to feel ignorant of. There is simply the eternal now, in which all is present and all is known. There is no training of the so-called physical senses in God's school, no need of the study of the psychology of the human mind, for the real senses of man are spiritual, bestowed upon him by his Father-Mother, and needing no training. No material laws, human philosophy, scholastic theology, no intricacies of mortal belief, have to be studied. The only science is the Science of being, Christian Science; the only law, the infinite law of Love and Truth; and the child of God knows these eternally.

Still another duty of a parent is to look after his child's health. A well-known proverb implies that prevention is better than cure, and surely our heavenly Father-Mother has provided for this in making His children incapable of sickness. Health is the holiness of the consciousness and is therefore unchangeably perfect. When we really understand that God is our Life, that our supply, our abiding place, our consciousness, our intelligence, our health, all come from God, this knowledge must inevitably be followed by length of days in "the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee." This land is the kingdom of heaven, defined by Mrs. Eddy in the Glossary of Science and Health (p. 590) as "the reign of harmony in divine Science; the realm of unerring, eternal, and omnipotent Mind; the atmosphere of Spirit, where Soul is supreme."

The Father-Mother God Frederick Dixon

The Fifth Commandment, "Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee" may seem almost the easiest to understand, but is, in some ways, perhaps the most difficult.

Jesus no doubt saw clearly that the man who did not honor his material father and mother would be incapable of honoring his spiritual Father-Mother, God. The writer of the first epistle of John makes this quite clear, when he says, "If a man say, I love God, and hateth his brother, he is a liar: for he that loveth not his brother whom he hath seen, how can he love God whom he hath not seen?"

Now, though Jesus was insistent that men should honor their material parents, he was equally clear that the real Father and Mother of all mankind was God, Principle. He told the Pharisees plainly that the material father was personified evil, meaning undoubtedly by this, the belief that human generation was not the reality, but that spiritual creation was. And this he made equally clear to the multitude when he insisted, "Call no man your father upon the earth: for one is your Father, which is in heaven." And this is surely what Mrs. Eddy is referring to when she writes, "The material body, which you call me, is mortal mind, and this mind is material in sensation, even as the body, which has originated from this material sense and been developed according to it, is material." (*S&H*, p. 416)

The spiritual lesson, then, which has to be derived from the superficial material meaning of the Commandment, is that which Jesus drew, and which Mrs. Eddy has explained in *Science and Health*. It is that the real Father-Mother is God, and that man, in the image and likeness of God, cannot be a human being, but must be a divine idea. In this way only can the human family be made one, and in this way only is it possible to understand what Jesus meant when he replied to those who declared that his mother and his brethren sought him, "Who is my mother? and who are my brethren? And he stretched forth his hand toward his disciples, and said, Behold my mother and my brethren! For whosoever shall do the will of my Father which is in heaven, the same is my brother, and sister, and mother." Thus the fatherhood and motherhood of God has to be realized exceedingly clearly if healing is to be accomplished, in the only way it can be accomplished, through Love.

The man who saw all creation as the children of divine Mind, and who claimed for all God's children the fatherhood of Principle, had reduced the whole question of family, nation, and humanity, to its true metaphysical significance. The unity of mankind, he recognized, could only be brought about by unity of thinking. The children of God were those who understood and acted on Principle. These people, whether fishermen from Capernaum or publicans from the receipt of custom, were to him brother, and sister, and mother. He was prepared to love them all alike, just as he knew they must love him.

God was not his Father alone, but the Father of all who did the will of Principle. Never once did he claim that this fatherhood was confined to himself. He spoke of our Father and your Father indiscriminately, obviously meaning that the real man had only one Father and one Mother, Principle. Mrs. Eddy says, "Father-Mother is the name for Deity, which indicates His tender relationship to His spiritual creation. As the apostle expressed it in words which he quoted with approbation from a classic poet: 'For we are also His offspring.'" (*S&H*, p. 332)

In honoring his human father and mother, whom he has seen, he is but taking a preliminary step to honoring his spiritual Father-Mother God, whom he has not seen. The crucifixion of the flesh means, if it means anything at all, the getting clear on this momentous question. Behind it lie all the passions of separation with which the world is flooded, because these passions have their source in the belief of a limited love of the human being for a select and selected number of other human beings. This is not honoring divine Mind, for it is attempting to limit love first to family, and then to nation, in a way which is the foundation of strife. In order to obliterate all strife, to heal the sick, it is absolutely essential that the practitioner should realize that nothing but the image and likeness of God exists. It was, among other reasons, because he realized this so clearly, that the human being gave place always, in Christ Jesus' consciousness, to the image and likeness of God, with the result that the patient was healed. Mrs. Eddy writes, "Jesus beheld in Science the perfect man, who appeared to him where sinning mortal man appears to mortals. In this perfect man the Saviour saw God's own likeness, and this correct view of man healed the sick." (S&H, p. 476-477)

Thus Jesus, in honoring his Father-Mother God, made the days of the human being longer in the land which Principle had given him; for he taught the world how to master sin, and thus, in overcoming sin, to overcome disease and death.

Honour thy father and mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee.

This includes honor to the earthly parents. There cannot be too much honor accorded to our earthly parents, or too much obedience to them so far as they rightly demand obedience. But is this all our divine injunction means? Who are our parents? Whom did Jesus say was our Parent? The Heavenly Parent, and the Heavenly Parent is our Father-Mother God. Then in its highest sense, the commandment is to honor our Heavenly Parent, God. How shall he be honored? By having no other gods, no other Power, Intelligence, Life, Love or Truth than Him. To honor is to obey. Obedience to God then is compliance with this commandment.

Obedience

It is sometimes remarked that much difficulty is experienced at this time in the government of children, and that Christian Science parents do not teach their children to obey. They say, "Oh, Love will take care of them," and let it go at that. In consequence of this, the child follows his own will, acquires an exalted estimate of his own judgment and capabilities, and has very little respect for authority, while his teachers and others have to suffer for his parents' neglect. Yet, the Fifth Commandment tells us, "Honour thy father and mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee."

In the days of our fathers, children were taught submission to their elders in thought, speech, and action, almost to the point of losing their individuality. The old-fashioned orthodox parent often required obedience through fear of punishment, rather than love of doing right.

Against the extreme severity and narrowness of this training, as we all know, there has been a very natural revolt. Human nature is apt to go from one extreme to the other in all things; its unreasoning impulse carrying it past a safe middle course before it stops to find its bearings. So in the present day and generation we witness the undignified spectacle of parents meekly submitting to the encouraged tyranny of even their young children.

While not holding for the rigid old-fashioned discipline, obedience is realized to be of paramount importance. The cruelty of not requiring a child to obey has been proven throughout history. A child's first lesson must be one of obedience, for his own safety's sake and for the sake of all with whom he may come in contact in his later life. How, then, shall we who realize that only by the strictest obedience to Principle is any good to be gained, we who are admonished in the Bible and in our textbook to obey the divine law, how shall we slight or ignore the sacred obligation to bring up our children to be obedient to Truth?

It is vain to say, "Love will take care of him," if we are making no effort to help him realize this sacred truth for himself. A casting aside of responsibility in this way is equivalent to declaring that there is no sin while we are indulging in sin — and our textbook deals very plainly with this error.

Respect for authority, together with a systematically developed ability to discriminate between the false authority and the true, should be the equipment of every child of Christian Science parents. In St. Paul's epistle to the Ephesians, he counsels the children to obey their parents, "for this is right." On page 62 of *Science and Health* we read, "The entire education of children should be such as to form habits of obedience to the moral and spiritual law." The untrained human will which chafes, rebels, or mocks at authority, does not make for true

freedom, but for a brief license which ends in bitterness and tears, until the road is retraced and the steps learned anew that lead from sense to Soul.

The Fifth Commandment A. Lincoln Rothblum

Among the first lessons taught to pupils in the Christian Science Sunday School is included a right apprehension of the spirit and the letter of the Fifth Commandment, "Honour thy father and thy mother: that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee," must precede its practical application in human affairs.

In the home, the affection and care for the child by the father and mother provide a glimpse of the constant protection and provision of God, divine Love, for His entire creation. Children may attest their gratitude for Love's beneficence, by yielding instant obedience to their parents.

Christian Science emphasizes the necessity for obedience to divine Principle. It also stresses the imperative need for obedience to wise parental authority. The Apostle Paul enjoins, "Children, obey your parents in all things: for this is well pleasing unto the Lord."

On page 236 of Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures the spiritually scientific reason for obedience is established by Mrs. Eddy's declaration, "Children should obey their parents; insubordination is an evil, blighting the buddings of self-government." Young people, as well as their more mature brothers and sisters, are privileged to prove, through Christian Science, that permanent progress and rich rewards of well-doing follow when they honor their Father-Mother God by rendering obedience to their human parents. The benefit and bliss of obedience demonstrated in childhood make home a preparatory school for later years: it becomes the cultural center for much that constitutes the good in human experience.

Man, in the image and likeness of his Maker,

expresses dominion through obedience to the mandates Mind, and this spiritual of fact demonstrated in human experience is bright with promise of definite progress and higher intellectual attainments. The mental atmosphere of room, auditorium, and playground is accordingly elevated by such spiritualized thinking. By these signs schoolmates vet unacquainted with the blessings of obedience, may recognize that young Christian Scientists are endeavoring to honor their Father-Mother God, and to reflect credit upon their parents.

Pointedly the Bible presents the comparative effects on parents of the obedience and the disobedience of their children in school and elsewhere by the proverb, "A wise son maketh a glad father: but a foolish son is the heaviness of his mother."

Through the Science of Christianity, growing boys and girls may realize the consequent nothingness of unworthy motives, which vainly attempt to present hindrances to proper conduct. By an increasing realization of the Christ-consciousness there may demonstrated the protected liberty of action within the encircling security and safety of Soul. Children of every age, who cultivate obedience, are God-guided and God-governed, and earn the benediction, "All honor and success to those who honor their father and mother," as Mrs. Eddy says on page 29 of her Message to The Mother Church for 1901.

With Christlike affection for children, Mrs. Eddy gives wondrous encouragement to young people, whereby their obedience, demonstrated in daily pursuits, may lay the foundation for grand careers and serve to illustrate a lofty standard of local and world citizenship. In tender phrases, Mrs. Eddy writes (Miscellaneous Writings, p. 110): "Beloved children, the world has need of you, — and more as children than as men and women: it needs your innocence, faithful unselfishness, affection, taminated lives," and farther on she adds, "What grander ambition is there than to maintain in yourselves what Jesus loved, and to know that your example, more than words, makes morals for mankind!"

Three times a day Mrs. Eddy took time to work for the Cause of Christian Science and for all the world. There were those in Germany, it is related, that tried for three years to bring about the first world war. But Mrs. Eddy was working, and this evil intent could not be accomplished then.

Similarly, it was not until right after Mrs. Eddy's passing [December 3, 1910] that three monumental events took place in this country, which have served to keep the populace in bondage to political and financial enterprise ever since. Was it merely coincidental that two of these three major developments were also significant planks in Karl Marx's *Communist Manifesto*, serving to erode individual rights and liberty, giving socialism its first stranglehold on this country?, what many believe to be the culminating ultimate social and political evil.

These events were the following:

- 1. The Federal Reserve Bank a centralized banking system
 - 2. a graduated tax system
 - 3. the popular election of senators.

Additionally, the formation of the League of Nations (the fore-runner of the United Nations), occurred about this time. The first step in the destruction or subordination of this Godinspired and ordained nation to international interests, subverting our sovereignty and nationalism to outside interests was put in place.

What evil Mrs. Eddy kept at bay while she was here we may never fully know. James Gilman relates the following on this topic (*Recollections of Mary Baker Eddy*, p. 48); "malicious animal magnetism had been trying all over the land to precipitate evil leading into all sorts of sin and destruction, seeking to lay its work to Christian Scientists, but said she, 'I have been holding it back.'" (A whole volume could be written on the work Mrs. Eddy did for the world in holding crime and evil in check.)

"Mrs. Eddy once told her household: 'If I

should be taken from you, the students will have to do a great deal of work for the universal welfare, to make up for what I have done."

History Corner

Sunday School and Christening at The Mother Church Clifford P. Smith

The first Christian Science Sunday School was conducted in 1881 by Asa G. Eddy. Although conducted for the Church of Christ, Scientist, it is not mentioned in the Church's minutes. Probably it was informal, and did not last long. Probably, also, it was for adults, rather than for children. Mrs. Eddy preserved the history of this inception of our Sunday School by mentioning it in certain editions of *Science and Health* and on page 42 of *Retrospection and Introspection*.

In the fall of 1883, the Church of Christ, Scientist, decided to have a Sunday School, and arranged to hold it before the Sunday service. Yet, the execution of this plan was postponed. Instead, for a time, the main feature of the Sunday service was to be a Bible lesson, rather than a sermon.

The Sunday School of the Church of Christ, Scientist, was actually formed on October 25, 1885 (The First Church of Christ, Scientist, and Miscellany, p. 55). There were elected a Superintendent, an Assistant Superintendent, a Secretary, a Treasurer, a Chorister, and a Committee on Music, besides six teachers. After the Church service on the next Sunday, the Superintendent of the Sunday School invited all who desired to become members, which invitation was accepted by "seventy adults and children." The number of children, as compared with the number of older persons, was not recorded, but a few Sundays later, when the Sunday School numbered one hundred and two pupils besides eleven officers and teachers, a visitor noted that "those present were mostly adults" (Journal for January, 1886, Vol. 3, p. 185). This Sunday School met at a different time from the Church service, either before or after; and it continued, subject to interruptions vacations, until the Church of Christ, Scientist, was reorganized, in 1892, as The First Church of Christ, Scientist. The Mother Church.

In contrast with our present usages, an early

episode that seems odd or strange was a christening of children by the Pastor of the Church of Christ, Scientist. On February 26, 1888, in Chickering Hall, Mrs. Eddy christened twentynine children. Their names, plus the fact that she christened them at this time and place, were entered in the Church record. As described in The Christian Science Journal for March, 1888, the christening service took the place of the regular Sunday service, and included an address on names and baptism by the Pastor. The christening itself was described in these words: "Raising her hands over each in turn, she then repeated the name, and very slowly and emphatically pronounced this blessing: 'May the baptism of Christ with the Holy Spirit cleanse vou from sin, sickness, and death." The rite did not include the use of water. Three of the children were Mrs. Eddy's grandchildren. This christening appears to have been both the first and the last in the Church of Christ, Scientist.

Mrs. Eddy showed her love for children in many ways. In The Christian Science Journal for 1895, she made April, the following announcement: "On the first Sunday of each month a sermon shall be preached to the children, from selections taken from the Scriptures and Science and Health, specially adapted to the occasion, and read after the manner of the Sunday service." The first of these children's services occurred on April 14, 1895. As reported in the next issue of the Journal, the main features of the service were the children's sermon and music by a choir from First Church of Christ, Scientist, of New York City. In the Journal for the next month, there was an announcement that the children's service would occur once in four months, and the date of the next one was given, but this plan appears to have been abandoned before this date.

In the October number of the *Journal*, there was a notice from Mrs. Eddy headed, "What We Can Do for the Children," in which she notified loyal Christian Scientists "to organize immediately a Sunday School for the children," to be held immediately after Sunday services. The notice continued with directions for the lessons substantially the same as those which now constitute Article XX, Section 3, of the

Church Manual. The Sunday School of The Mother Church *for children* was organized on October 5, 1895, having a Superintendent, an Assistant Superintendent, and two teachers. At first, the ages of the children were not limited. In January of the next year, the rule was adopted that children under twelve could be admitted, but children could not remain after becoming fifteen years of age (Church Minutes, Vol. II, p. 142).

Another service for children occurred on Sunday, June 10, 1906, when The Mother Church dedicated its new edifice. On this day there were six services, at one of which (12:30 p.m.) children given preference in seating congregation; and they filled most of the seats. In its report of this dedication, the Boston *Herald* reported the children's service as follows: "It was 'children's day' at noon, for the service at half past twelve was specially reserved for them. They filled all the seats in the body of the church, and when it came to the singing, the little ones were not a whit behind their elders, their shrill trebles rising with the roll of the organ in almost perfect time. In every respect their service was the same as all the others."

The articles for children or young people which began lately to be marked as such in the Christian Science Sentinel are not the first to be distinguished in such a way. From 1886 to 1889, The Christian Science Journal had a department headed "Home," which was mainly for children and parents. Then, except for an interval in 1889, it had a "Home and Children's Department" until 1891. For a few months in 1903, the Sentinel included a department or section headed "For the Children." The articles or items for children in the Journal from 1886 to 1891 consisted chiefly of healings by children, stories having a moral or spiritual point, poems (mostly reprinted), and reviews of books. Articles on Christian Science or on teaching Christian Science to children became more frequent toward the end of this period, but never became more than occasional. The section "For the Children" in the Sentinel contained articles and poems (partly reprinted) intended to interest and instruct juvenile readers; and it was a distinct improvement over the earlier departments in the *Journal*. Nevertheless, this section in the Sentinel was discontinued then for the lack of enough articles having a spiritual value. Presumably the corresponding department in the *Journal* was discontinued for the same reason.

Out of the large correspondence commending my labors, I present to my biographer the enclosed letter from one of New Hampshire's noblest sons — ex-Gov. Moody Currier. It has the special merit of being free from preconceived views; it breathes the inborn strength of our Granite state; it kindles anew the fires of religious freedom, lighting an illustrious life, and lifting the shadows of over three-score years and ten.

My Dear Mrs. Eddy:

Some days since, I had the pleasure of receiving by express two nice volumes, containing your card, showing that I am indebted to you for the very welcome present, for which I most heartily thank you. From a hasty examination I am sure I shall receive much satisfaction in their further perusal and study.

It gives me great pleasure to find your system so free from mystical creeds and theological dogmas. Every theory of philosophy or religion, in order to stand the scientific criticism of the present day, must be founded upon the eternal laws of God. The original method of your teachings reminds me very forcibly of the characteristic manner of your lamented brother, Albert, who thoroughly despised every appearance of sham and pretense in the pretended teachers of mankind.

I wish to congratulate you upon the broad and independent foundation on which you are now building your great work, and trust that your fame and renown may last as long as the principles you teach.

"Put on the whole armour of God, that ye may be able to stand against the wiles of the devil." Eph. 6:11

Elliott's Commentary says, "The special emphasis in this verse is on 'the whole armour,' ... not on its strength or its brightness, but on its completeness, leaving no one point unguarded by carelessness."

"To put on the 'armour of God' is declared to be to 'put on the Lord Jesus Christ.' Hence its completeness corresponds to the divine perfection of His true humanity. We are to put on His image in all the harmony of truth and righteousness, of peace and faith, to receive and use His salvation and wield the spiritual energy of His Word."

Matthew Poole's Commentary says: "'That ye may be able to stand'; either to fight, or rather to overcome. He that loses the victory is said to fall; he that gains it, to stand."

"'Against the wiles of the devil:' The devil useth arts and stratagems, as well as force and violence, and therefore, if any part of your spiritual armour be wanting, he will assault you

where he finds you weakest.

From *Matthew Henry*: "Our Redeemer is almighty, and in the power of his might we may overcome."

During her classes, Mrs. Evans often asked us to stand up and tell her what our weak spot was, and how error would try to use it to get to us. She was helping us to recognize our weak spots and to shore them up. As Mrs. Eddy writes, "Mankind must learn that evil is not power. Its so-called despotism is but a phase of nothingness. Christian Science despoils the kingdom of evil." (*S&H*, 102:30)

This church happens to be the center of Independent Christian Science, and the devil doesn't like it; mortal mind, so-called, doesn't like it, because Christian Science is mortal mind's destroyer. Christian Science teaches only one Mind, God. Especially when doing work for church, we need to be aware of that weak spot and put on the "whole armor of God." If you can learn to strengthen your citadel and stand up to the errors that would try to keep you from doing what God wants you to do, the growth will be immense.

What is sin? The personification of evil, dishonesty, and craftiness — that's what the wiles of the devil are. We are to prove that the so-called wiles of the devil are nothingness. In belief, it seems to be something, so we have to prove its nothingness — and we can, and we do, and this is how. But it would seem to be crafty, to get you off guard or get you upset about some cherished thing. That's why we put everything on God's altar; we give everything to God.

Remember when these errors come, they are designed to make us forget or neglect our duty to God, to our Leader, and to mankind. (Manual) They are designed to do that. Be prepared, don't be dismayed, and don't give in to it. Stand up to it, and you will be victorious! Error wants you silent; it will seem to attack your weak spot because it comes tailor-made just for you. That's why it's important for us to learn what our weak spots are. The only way we can learn what they are is to learn from our mistakes, be humble enough to admit them, and learn from them — that's how we make our weak spots our strong points.

In an article from a 1926 Christian Science Sentinel by Ella Hoag called "Standing for God," she makes the point, in order to stand fast, you need to be standing fast "in the Lord." If your motive is to serve God, if your motive is right, if your motive is love, you will stand, and you will keep standing, and nothing will knock you over. If you're standing for your own agenda, you'll get knocked over very easily. When you see people who have a righteous cause, they will stand, and it's admirable. Certainly, look at Mrs. Eddy or Christ Jesus. They crucified him and he still stood, and he rose from the dead. You're undefeatable if you stand in the Lord. If you are standing on what's right, what's principled, no matter how much error blows, it will not knock vou down.

What is the whole armour of God? It's our thoughts, our conviction of our oneness with God, what you know to be true about God, about God's creation, however little it might be. And if it's the truth about God and God's creation, you put it on, and you don't put anything else on, you don't dilute it. It gives you everything — loins girt with truth, the breastplate of righteousness,

preparation of the gospel. We have to have that foundation in the Bible and *Science and Health*. You protect yourself with the shield of faith, and the sword of Spirit. It's like a complete armoring of our thoughts.

Yes, the sword of the spirit is the word of God. The Word! You combat error with the Word. That's why I call it your arsenal. When Jesus was tempted of the devil, what did he say? He said, "It is written." He knew the Bible of that time, and he combatted the error with, "It is written." So remember that, "Put on the whole armour of God."

Standing for God

Men have always agreed that, to stand for anything, has meant to remain fixed and steadfast in loyalty; that whatever the opposition or resistance, to stand must imply an immovable allegiance. In his epistle to the Philippians, Paul wrote, "Therefore, my brethren dearly beloved and longed for, my joy and crown, so stand fast in the Lord, my dearly beloved." And when testifying his love for the Thessalonians he declared, "Therefore, brethren, we were comforted over you in all our affliction and distress by your faith: for now we live, if ye stand fast in the Lord."

Paul understood full well that there is only one safe place to stand, and that is "in the Lord;" and how impossible it would be to "stand fast in the Lord" if the desire were for any but the unselfish and unselfed purpose of standing for God! No selfish aim could be sufficient to hold one firmly in such a stand, since selfishness always gives way under stress of temptation and trial. No one has ever stood firmly and effectively against evil unless with the purest, holiest motive, the love of God, good. To consider what standing for God includes, one must understand something of God Himself; and Christian Science is here revealing the entire truth about Him.

Christian Science reveals the truth that God is infinite divine Mind — is all-intelligence; that

He is all-pervading Spirit; that He is all Soul, including all spiritual sense; that He is all Life, Truth, Love. In *Miscellaneous Writings* (p. 206) Mrs. Eddy also speaks of God as "the active, allwise, law-creating, law-disciplining, law-abiding Principle." And then she goes on to say, "The real Christian Scientist is constantly accentuating harmony in word and deed, mentally and orally, perpetually repeating this diapason of heaven: 'Good is my God, and my God is good. Love is my God, and my God is Love.'" Standing for God as Christian Science instructs us to do, is not only the way whereby we fulfill our duty to God, but it is the way to deliver ourselves and others from all that is false and undesirable.

Does corporeal sense testify of discord and distress? How wonderful to be able to stand unmoved because the ever-present evidences of Soul and its perfections are at hand! These are all expressions of all-satisfying Life, Truth, Love.

It is not, therefore, strange that one thus steadfastly allegiant to good should continually unfold into a larger, fuller, more perfectly demonstrated understanding of God and unity with Him. How easy, then, to declare and prove perpetually that our God is good, and good is our God! That Love is our God, and our God is Love! To stand thus is constantly and continually to express the perfect government of divine Principle, Love, wherein and whereby all good is unfolded.

Cleansing the Temple Louise C. Martin

In the twenty-first chapter of Matthew there is a remarkable incident. We read that Jesus entered the temple, cast out all that sold and bought, and overthrew the tables of the money-changers and the seats of those who sold doves.

For many years this account presented a picture to me which I could scarcely associate with the gentle, loving Nazarene. Since then, however, the full significance of this lesson has dawned upon me, and it is no longer a surprise that Jesus used this radical means in cleansing the temple of what St. Paul calls "the root of all evil;" namely, the love of money.

In this age of commercialism and materiality, the love of money is perhaps the most prevalent and subtle evil among all peoples. Our most civilized nations seem engaged in a game of reckless scrambling for gold — and integrity, honesty, and truth are trampled upon in the frantic attempt to get it. To those who have entered the path which leads to the "land of Christian Science" (*S&H*, p. 226), a new world is revealed — the world of Spirit or Mind, of love for God and man, of peace and holiness. Within the sacred boundary of this holy city, money availeth

nothing. In his invitation to this divine habitation, Isaiah cried, "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." The prophet, although urging those who have no money, emphatically says "buy," implying that something we claim as our own must be given in exchange for this wine and milk of the Spirit. Then what shall be paid?

Christian Scientists, who have come to this fount, can answer the question. Long-cherished habits and indulgences, false estimates of our brother, arrogant justification of our own deeds and misdeeds, — these are the things we must part with (or pay) in exchange for true concepts, inspiring thoughts, holy motives and aims, a correct view of our brother as the image of God. There must be an uncompromising denial and dismissal of the subtle argument that would justify error in self, while condemning it in another.

Well did the prophet say "buy and eat," for we cannot hoard these wrong thoughts and at the same time partake of the "fruit of the Spirit" and relish its sweetness. The false concept must be cast away before the true can become our own. Perhaps at times the price seems a great one to pay, and before the new idea dawns in its glory,

we might say in our ignorance that we had lost that which was so pleasant and desirable. Nevertheless, we must all learn, since "a great sacrifice of material things must precede this advanced spiritual understanding" (*S&H*, p. 16).

This deeply rooted claim of evil, that money can buy peace and happiness, can and will be met, and it is the business of every Christian Scientist to search his consciousness and see if he is serving this falsity in any respect. He may think that since he gives liberally to the church, and fulfils other demands in an external way, he should receive a rich reward of peace and plenty. Perhaps he does these things at a sacrifice, and yet his problem of supply remains. An assertive suggestion of self-righteousness may whisper, "I do not see why it is that I cannot overcome the of limitation." What hinders demonstration? The living, acting Christ must come into that temple. The thought of material, personal ownership must be driven out, for "the earth is the Lord's, and the fulness thereof"; the belief that the acquisition of money is the gain of substance must be overturned; and the deepseated falsity that we can manipulate Mind to produce material accumulation must completely upset. Let us search deeply, and see if the basic motive of our every deed is to "glorify God," to magnify good to cause the light of Truth so to shine before men that the darkness of error may find no abiding-place.

Then will no grievous experience follow the triumphal entry into Jerusalem (the joyous welcome of the Christ into our consciousness). We have spread our garments in the way, have thrown off our material opinions and cast them down at the feet of Truth; we have waved the palm branches of praise and thanksgiving; have gone before and followed singing, "Hosanna in the highest," as we were filled with joy over this triumphal appearance of Truth in our midst. So let us "grieve not the holy Spirit" by hiding away within the temple the stupid, dear beliefs which must be beaten out "with many stripes," that the healing of the lame and blind may be accomplished. Let us keep the ear attuned to Spirit, and the eve that it be not heavy with blindness, while we tend our lamps, so that even though the bridegroom come at midnight, he shall find the temple spotless and the light glowing within.

"My Presence Shall Go with Thee" Duncan Sinclair

m T}$ he seers of the Old Testament were conscious of the presence of God. Some of the Hebrew prophets were able to do wondrous things, wondrous in the eyes of those whose consciousness was less spiritual. And what peace must have accompanied that realization! When Moses, in difficulty, prayed to God for His presence, God assured him, "My presence shall go with thee, and I will give thee rest." (Ex. 33) The Psalms contain many references to the omnipresence of God: "Whither shall I go from thy spirit? or whither shall I flee from thy presence? If I ascend up into heaven, thou art there: if I make my bed in hell, behold, thou art there," — meaning, surely, that God everywhere.

Christ Jesus lived and acted as always in the presence of the Father. He completely identified himself with God, stating that he could do nothing of himself, and that it was God who did the works; thereby testifying to the everpresence of God.

Nothing is of greater value than to know of God's omnipresence; for to know that God is omnipresent is to realize that Life, Love, Truth, and good are ever with us. Consequently, the supposed opposites of Life, Love, Truth, and good are not present anywhere — which destroys the beliefs of sickness and sin, those false beliefs which so grievously torment the human race.

We find great comfort, courage, and healing by realizing the allness of God, persistently and with conviction, keeping before the thought Mrs. Eddy's words: "The God-principle is omnipresent and omnipotent. God is everywhere, and nothing apart from Him is present or has power." (*S&H*, p. 473)

Evil may be trying hard to convince us, through suggestion, that it is real. Its tumult may

seem to be heard on every side. But what of that; is not God in the midst of us? Is not God, good, omnipresent; and has not Christian Science revealed to us the utter unreality of evil? Then let us affirm and realize the truth, thereby destroying the false evidence of material sense which would convince us that evil is real. How heartening are Mrs. Eddy's words: "God is individual, incorporeal. He is divine Principle, Love, the universal cause, the only creator, and there is no other self-existence. He is all-inclusive, and is reflected by all that is real and eternal and by nothing else." (*S&H*, p. 331)

"Lively Stones"

"Ye also, as lively stones, are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices, acceptable to God by Jesus Christ." (I Peter 2)

Peter's use of the word "stones" in combination with the word "lively" is quite unusual, but brings a practical lesson. To every alert worker in Christian Science, Peter's "lively stones" present a picture of great attractiveness; for there is nothing he desires more earnestly than to be invincibly steadfast in his allegiance to Principle, — to be as immovable as any stone.

At the same time, his purpose is always to express the greatest activity in the exercise of those very stone-like qualities. When Peter goes on to say that these lively stones "are built up a spiritual house, an holy priesthood, to offer up spiritual sacrifices," what does the offering of spiritual sacrifice mean, except the yielding of every material belief to the qualities of good, that the spiritual structure of righteousness may appear.

We each must be a "lively" stone. Each one must be firm, secure, and strong in his allegiance to Principle, and therefore not easily moved or disturbed by apparently adverse influence, — just steadily fixed in righteousness. But he must be equally quick to allow anything and everything that is unlike Principle to be cut away, that the

perfecting of the whole may appear in all its beauty.

One of the most important lessons for all Christian Scientists is to have their stones fit in the universal structure. One great difficulty is that each one is often thinking more about his own stone than of the perfection of the whole structure. Because of this he is apt to believe his stone is quite perfect as it is, and if it cannot appear just as he presents it — very well, then, it need not appear at all! He argues to himself that all his praying and studying and working has enabled him to get so close to God, divine Mind, that necessarily his stone must be perfect. But then — it doesn't fit! So, what is to be done about it? He must remember to be a "lively" stone; and this surely means the willingness to sacrifice even what may appear as beautiful to him, if it does not join in the presenting of a perfect structure.

Today, stones still need much polishing. There is still many a rough corner here and many a bump there to be smoothed away. There is many a human opinion, many a human desire, that must be sacrificed before the stones shall appear in all their beauty and perfection. Then Christian Scientists will do well always to remember to be "lively stones;" or, as our Leader tells us (Poems, p. 76): —

"Be awake; Like this stone, be in thy place Stand, not sit."

"A Double Portion Of Thy Spirit"

In the second chapter of II Kings we read: "And it came to pass, when they were gone over, that Elijah said unto Elisha, Ask what I shall do for thee, before I be taken away from thee. And Elisha said, I pray thee, let a double portion of thy spirit be upon me."

The first twenty-two verses of this chapter contain a wonderful lesson of faithfulness and love. Elisha, when plowing in his father's fields, recognized Elijah as a prophet of Truth, followed him, and ministered unto him. Thus when Elijah said to Elisha, "Ask what I shall do for thee, before I be taken away from thee," Elisha was ready to ask for a greater understanding of the truth that had enabled Elijah to heal the sick, raise the dead, and divide the waters so that they might walk on dry ground.

In response to this request, Elijah answered and said, "Thou hast asked a hard thing: nevertheless, if thou see me when I am taken from thee, it shall be so unto thee." In other words, if Elisha were able to perceive the underlying fact of divine Principle, and to recognize God's man as "never born and never dying" (*S&H*, p. 258), he would receive a double portion of the spirit, and his prayer would be answered.

They continued their journey, no doubt talking of the Father's loving-kindness, of the Life that knows no death. Suddenly, there appeared a chariot and horses of fire and parted them asunder, and Elijah was taken up by a whirlwind into heaven. "And Elisha saw it, and he cried, My father, my father, the chariot of Israel, and the horsemen thereof." Such rejoicing! The wonder of it! Not a moment's grief — there was only time to rejoice. Elisha had recognized his God as a God of life, not a God of death, and not for one instant did he tarry to agree with any sense testimony of separation. No; he took up the mantle which had fallen from Elijah, and went back and stood by the bank of Jordan. He took the mantle of Elijah and smote the waters and said, "Where is the Lord God of Elijah?" And when he had smitten the waters, they parted and Elisha went over.

Mrs. Eddy says: "Divine Science is absolute, and permits no halfway position in learning its Principle and rule — establishing it by demonstration." (*S&H*, p. 274) Had Elisha believed for one moment that his teacher had died, he would have been on the same plane of thought as the sons of the prophets who afterward sent men to search for Elijah. Elisha went to work to put into practice that which he had been taught. He went forward in the power of the Spirit and with "signs following." When the sons of the prophets saw him they said, "The

spirit of Elijah doth rest on Elisha."

Christian Science teaches that all may demonstrate the truth of man's birthright as a child of God. Our beloved Leader has said, "Follow your Leader, only so far as she follows Christ." (Messages to The Mother Church, p. 78) The way has been pointed out. The truth of being is revealed. It only remains for us to practice it.

Let us take up the study of our textbook with a double portion of the spirit, and with the garment of praise, separate the waters of mortal mind and cross over on dry ground. Then will "the sons of the prophets" recognize the lifegiving power of Spirit, and come and bow themselves before Truth in the acknowledgment of "God with us;" then, too, can we say with the poet,—

Henceforth my heart shall sigh no more For olden time and holier shore: God's love and blessing, then and there, Are now and here and everywhere.

More Light

Humanity cries for more light; yet in reality the light of Truth is here and the ultimate is always at hand. The kingdom of God spoken of by John the Baptist, Jesus, and Paul is always present, though not always humanly perceived. Its invariable characteristic is light.

The New Jerusalem knows no darkness. As we read in the Apocalypse: "And there shall be no night there; and they need no candle, neither light of the sun; for the Lord God giveth them light."

The experience of spiritual progress may be described as that of emerging into the light, leaving the darkness of the world behind, the blackness of sin, the density of mesmerism. A spiritual joyousness, spontaneous and invigorating, accompanies this advance. In the full light of the kingdom of heaven on earth there is no knowledge of evil; for evil is error, hence unreal. There the sting of the serpent has been extracted; former enemies are friends, what were

supposed to be trying, difficult experiences are recognized as having been privileges; the allembracing atmosphere of spiritual light is felt to include the totality of man and universe. In the Glossary of *Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures* the word "sun" is defined by Mrs. Eddy as "the symbol of Soul governing man, — of Truth, Life, and Love."

The child thought, which Jesus described as essential to those who enter the kingdom of God, is that uncontaminated state of consciousness which does not accept the supposititious powers and threats of material sense. Christian Science parents can do much to give their children a fair start. We read on page 237 of Science and Health, "Children should be taught the Truth-cure, Christian Science, among their first lessons, and kept from discussing or entertaining theories or thoughts about sickness. To prevent the experience of error and its sufferings, keep out of the minds of your children either sinful or diseased thoughts. The latter should be excluded on the same principle as the former. This makes Christian Science early available." Much valuable advice is given by Mrs. Eddy in her writings as to the proper education of children — and this advice is applicable to adults as well.

A special injunction rests upon Christian Scientists to reflect the light lest darkness again settle upon the earth and the footprints of former reformers be swept away by a returning tide of the restless sea of error. Jesus once said to his disciples: "Yet a little while is the light with you. Walk while ye have the light, lest darkness come upon you: for he that walketh in darkness knoweth not whither he goeth. While ye have light, believe in the light, that ye may be the children of light. These things spake Jesus, and departed, and did hide himself from them."

Was Jesus momentarily oppressed by the suggestion of a possible reversal of his teachings in the future? Did he perceive what his disciples did not, — the ruthless determination of the darkness not to yield before the light; the purpose of the blackness of myth and mysticism, of obscurantism and occultism to raise an army of Antichrist to combat the Christ, Truth, he came to impart? Was this the reason why he "did hide himself from them," that he might pray for

the world and avert the threatened danger? Christian Scientists in this era are not exempt from the obligations imposed upon the children of light in all times. Loyally attentive to the warnings of their Leader, they stand ready to repulse open and secret attempts to plunge the world once more into pre-Christian gloom.

God's Creatures

One morning recently I woke up to what looked sort of like signs that a mouse had been on my kitchen counter, which was quite distressing to me. I run a pretty tight ship around here, and mice don't belong in the house. Further, I have always been somewhat squeamish of crawling things in many categories.

As I was spraying down the counter though, I was recognizing that I should not give in to these feelings of fear and dismay over the situation that was beginning to overcome me. I was contemplating this while opening the window shades for the day, when I nearly jumped out of my skin, seeing that there was a bat hanging upside down on the window trim. In forty some vears of living in northern New Hampshire, it's not entirely uncommon to have bats show up once in a while where they don't belong, but what was unusual for me was my response. I knew that it was right here and now that I had to demonstrate my dominion over fear, and it had nothing to do with a little furry creature, (quite a large one, I might add) hanging on my window.

I began to think very clearly, and the first thought that came was that all of God's creatures

are harmless, useful, and indestructible, as Mrs. Eddy writes in *Science and Health*. (p. 514) I figured if this is true, then the reverse — that there is a creature that is bad and harmful — could not be true. So, what happened then was that without even thinking about it, my response and main concern in the situation became to move the bat without hurting him. Normally, I would have called someone else to get the bat, and at the very least my last concern would have been one of his well being. This feeling that came over me of wanting to preserve the bat's well being was very unexpected and somehow very comforting to me, and it was then that I realized that it was because I was reflecting God's love.

I calmly put a towel in the bottom of a bucket, got a ladder and some gloves, and gently pushed him into the bucket and carried it very harmoniously outdoors. This may not seem like a big thing to many people, but for me it was revolutionary, and the best part of it was how my thought was totally transformed from one of protecting myself from the bat, to protecting the bat, God's creature. That was certainly nothing I could have ever dreamed of and brings me to my knees to realize the wonder and amazing glory of how God works. In Genesis, God gives man

dominion over all the Earth and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the Earth. I am so grateful for this truth, and the practical way in which I saw it realized this morning.

Practicing Instead of Only Reading Christian Science Michaela Enzmann

I am grateful for the encouragement in this church to not only study, but also practice Christian Science. During a Sunday Roundtable discussion on Watching Point 24, from 500 Watching Points by Gilbert Carpenter, it was noted that not only studying Christian Science, but also applying and practicing it, is necessary, and that a balance between the two is required.

Before coming to Plainfield, as many others who have spoken up, I too had the notion that by studying or reading Mrs. Eddy's writings, and our daily Bible lesson, I would be harvesting the effects of Christian Science.

As I parked the car, the children ran in the house, I gathered my things together including my phone which I had left in the car and had not looked at for some time. To my surprise the screen was full of messages from different people trying to get hold of me to tell me that one of my sheep was in a bad way.

I immediately called the children, we jumped back in the car and drove to the sheep's field. It was a few weeks before lambing time and I knew that heavily-pregnant ewes with very full, thick fleeces would be feeling this heat more than anyone. All the way there I declared out loud whatever truths came to me. God is Governing. There is nothing going on but good. The sheep are perfect reflections of God. The sheep are God's perfect children, they cannot be touched by error. And whatever else I could think of.
